TOP FOUR RECEIVE SPECIAL HONORS

In a banner year of academic excellence at Devilbiss High School, four students stand at the very top. Each has achievements in a wide area of studies. Although point averages are very close, the personalities of these students are highly individualistic and their achievements carry a distinctive mark.

As in the past two years, a young woman has been named valedictorian. Dianne Monske, of the 1981 graduating class, received this honor with a superior 4.311 grade average.

Dianne carries behind her a very impressive academic background. She is vice-president of the National Honor Society, a four-year Russian student, and was president of her Junior Class. Last year, she was voted first runner-up for Most Outstanding Girl.

Dianne has also displayed abilities in the athletic area. She has played volleyball on the Devilbiss Junior Varsity Team for three years.

Miss Monske admits that she has earned her honors through hard work. "I know that I can do well, and if I don't try, I feel that I'm letting myself down," explains a confident Dianne. "I found that school became easier as I went along. I spent anywhere from two to five hours a night on homework during my freshman year, where now I rarely study for more than an hour," she said.

Dianne feels that her senior year has been the easiest since grade school because "after so long, you get to know what teachers want and expect. You don't have to do a lot of unnecessary studying to get an A."

This graduate's future plans consist of entering the Toledo Hospital School of Nursing.

William Rutchow, who is tied with David Wilson for the distinction of being salutatorian, has a 4.28 grade average.

Bill is a member of two quiz bowls: the regular Devilbiss Quiz Bowl and the Russian Quiz Bowl. He is a four-year Russian student and has been a Russian club member since entering Devilbiss. This jovial wit is a member of the National Honor Society and he is Organizations Commissioner of the student government.

Athletically, Bill has been involved with tennis for which he has received a varsity letter.

Rutchow has also received such awards as Commended Student in the National Merit Scholarship Competition, the Edison Science Award, and he was named first Outstanding Boy in his sophomore and junior years.

Bill has been offered academic scholarships from Kent State, Ohio State, and Miami State. He has decided to attend Miami in the fall where he will study political science.

David Wilson, otherwise known as "Captain Von Trapp" from the character he portrayed in The Sound of Music, also received the honor of being salutatorian. He holds an impressive 4.28 grade-point average.

Dave has been strongly active during his three years at Devilbiss. A quiet, introverted scholar, Dave has been involved with activities in the music department. He is vice-president of the German Club and belongs to P. J. O'Rourke. Dave is a member of the National Honor Society.

One of Dave's most outstanding accomplishments this year was the organization and distribution of Christmas baskets for needy families.

Dave's future plans are to attend Ohio State University where he will study either civil engineering or pre-med.

Graduation Units May Change

The present requirement of 17 units of credit for graduation from DeVilbiss may be changed to 19.

The proposed change will be presented by Dr. Rosie Doughty, assistant superintendent for curriculum and instruction at the May 26 meeting of the board of education.

If the vote is favorable, the new curriculum will be as follows: three units in English, two units in mathematics, three units in social studies, two in science one-half in physical education and health, and one unit in practical and/or fine arts and seven units in electives.

If the new requirements are agreed upon, schools will be monitored for three years to see if the change causes an increase in high school dropouts.

THE ARMY CAN HELP YOU

Has the thought of financing college been lingering in your mind? Through the willingness of offering your services to the Army, there can be a solution to both getting your education and financing it. There are a variety of alternatives which the Army can offer an interested student who is planning to attend a college or a technical college.

One program which can be considered is the Veterans Education Assistant Program, or VEAP. In this program, your college education begins after your services to the Army. When the service time is over, the Army will pay the veteran twice the amount of money which he has saved to use in financing college. There is also an advantage to this if you receive better than a 31 on the QT test or entrance examination. It is called the VEAP "kicker." This includes an extra 100 dollars per month after the first twelve months of service.

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Another alternative is the ROTC or Reserve Officer Training Corps. In this program your education comes before entering the Army. The Army pays for the education with an agreement that upon graduation you will serve a minimum of four years.

While in the Army, you can choose to take the College Level Examination. This is sometimes called the CLEP test. This particular test will credit you for your first year of college--if passed. It consists of a series of five six-hour tests.

Another test offered is the End-of-Course Test. With this test, you can choose from a list of different subjects to take. If passed, this test will grant you three semester hours of college credits.
